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the purpose of promoting the temporal, moral and religious welfare of women, especially young women who are dependent on their own exertions for support; and said association may choose all needful officers, and have power to hold property, real and personal, in any manner lawfully acquired, to an amount not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, and adopt any constitution, regulations and by-laws not inconsistent with the laws of the state, which they may deem necessary for conducting the business of said association.

**CHAP. 312.**

Purpose.

May choose officers.  
May hold property.  
Constitution and by-laws.

SECT. 2. The first meeting of said corporation shall be holden at such time and place, and be notified in such manner as a majority of the persons named in this act shall direct.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

**Chapter 312.**

An act to incorporate the Greenough Church Edifice Association.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

SECT. 1. Charles Staples, Alfred Haskell, Alphonzo L. Gilkey, Albion K. P. Small, William H. Shailer, George F. Emery, Samuel A. True, J. B. Mathews, and John C. Phoenix, their successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Greenough Church Edifice Association, for the purpose of aiding to build, purchase or improve Baptist meeting houses in the State of Maine, and promoting such other religious uses and purposes as are contemplated by the last will and testament of Byron Greenough, late of Portland, in the county of Cumberland, deceased; and said association may choose all needful officers, and have power to hold property, real and personal, in any manner lawfully acquired, to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and adopt any by-laws and regulations, not inconsistent with the laws of this state, which they may deem necessary for conducting the business of said association.
