Chapter 112.

Снар. 112.

Resolve in favor of the town of Lyndon.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the state treasury to the Town of Lyndon, town of Lyndon, as bounty on wild animals, not allowed in general resolve of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, the sum of five dollars additional to that allowed last year.

Approved February 6, 1873.

Chapter 113.

Resolve in favor of Samuel T. Sewall.

Resolved, That the land agent be and he is hereby authorized S. T. Sewell, in and directed to deed to Samuel T. Sewall of Island Falls, in the county of Aroostook, lot numbered fourteen in township numbered four, range four, west from the east line of the state, waiving further settling duties.

Approved February 6, 1873.

Chapter 114.

Resolve authorizing the adjutant general to sell the gun house at Milo.

Resolved, That the adjutant general is hereby authorized to sell Authorizing sale the gun house, and lot of land on which the same is situated, in the town of Milo, in the county of Piscataquis, to any person or persons applying therefor, for such sum as he may think is reasonable and right. All resolves inconsistent with this resolve are hereby repealed.

Chapter 115.

Resolve in aid of a road in Crystal plantation.

Resolved, That the sum of six hundred and fifty dollars be, and Road in Crystal. the same is hereby appropriated in aid of building and repairing roads and bridges in Crystal plantation; four hundred to be expended on the lower road, so called, leading from Kimball's mills by Sumner Bradford's house, to Patten village; and two hundred and fifty dollars to be expended on that portion of the road leading
