## CHAP. 184.

## Chapter 184.

An act to incorporate the Maine Unitarian Association.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Samuel E. Spring, Amos D. Wheeler, Moses M. Butler, Joseph Dane, Edward W. Morton, Francis M. Sabine, William C. Crosby, John D. Hopkins, David N. Sheldon, J. T. G. Nichols, Charles E. Jose, Mark P. Emery, their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a corporation by the name of

the Maine Unitarian Association, for the maintenance and teaching of Unitarian christianity, with the power by that name to

prosecute and defend suits at law or in equity, to have a common seal, to take, hold and enjoy, by purchase, gift or otherwise, real

May hold real and personal estate.

and personal property not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars, with all the incidents of ownership ; to make such by-laws,

not repugnant to the laws of the state, as it may deem necessary for the management of its concerns ; and, generally, to have all the powers and privileges of corporations of like nature.

Powers and privileges.

Members may be admitted.

SECT. 2. Any person, male or female, who is or may be an acting member of any Unitarian parish, church or society now existing, or hereafter to exist in this state, may be admitted a member of said corporation by vote of said corporation, or in accordance with by-laws which may be adopted by the corporation on the subject.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 3. The first meeting of the corporation may be called by any three of said corporators, by giving at least ten days' notice to the other corporators of the time and place of meeting ; said notice shall be deemed sufficient to said other corporators, if deposited, post-paid, in the post office, properly addressed, ten days before the meeting. A majority of the corporators shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business until otherwise ordered by the corporation.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.
