CHAP. 387
Corporate name.

Powers and privileges. their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate by the name of the Bath Driving Park, and by that name shall have power to sue and be sued, prosecute and defend all suits at law and in equity, and shall have all rights and privileges incident to such corporations, with right to adopt a common seal.

Capital stock.

SECT. 2. The capital stock of said corporation may be fixed by the vote of the stockholders at an amount not to exceed thirty-five thousand dollars, and shall be divided into shares, the par value of which shall be twenty-five dollars per share.

May hold real estate.

SECT. 3. Said corporation shall have power to purchase and hold real estate in the county of Sagadahoc, or in Brunswick, in the county of Cumberland, the value of which, with improvements and betterments, shall not exceed twenty thousand dollars, and personal property not exceeding in value ten thousand dollars, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a driving park, in order to aid in the improvement of the breed and value of horses in this state, and may adopt such rules, regulations and by-laws, as shall be deemed necessary, not repugnant to the laws of the state.

Purpose.

Powers of police. Sect. 4. All the powers and duties of the police of the city of Bath shall extend over such land as this corporation shall hold in Brunswick for the purpose herein named, con-

current with the police of Brunswick.

First meeting, how called. SECT. 5. The first meeting of corporators may be called by either of the corporators, by giving public notice in the Bath Daily Times, seven days before the meeting.

Sect. 6. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 387.

An act to authorize Samuel Cunningham to navigate Androscoggin pend and Dead river, by steam.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Samuel Cunningham and associates, rights of. SECT. 1. Samuel Cunningham, his associates and assigns, are hereby vested with the sole and exclusive right to navigate, by steam, the Androscoggin pond and Dead river, in

the towns of Wayne and Leeds, for the term of twenty years; Chap. 388 provided, that if the said Cunningham, his associates and Proviso. assigns, shall neglect, for the term of one year, to navigate the said pond and river by steam, this act shall be void.

Said Cunningham, his associates and assigns, Powers, duties are hereby vested with all the powers, duties and privileges usually granted to such corporations.

This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 388.

An act to change the name of the town of Lyndon to Caribou.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

The name of the town of Lyndon, in Aroostook county, is hereby changed to Caribou.

Chapter 389.

An act to amend an act entitled "an act to incorporate the East Oxford Agricultural Society," approved February twenty-eight, in the year our Lord eighteen hundred and sixty-one.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Section three of an act entitled, "an act to Act amended. incorporate the East Oxford Agricultural Society," is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words, viz: 'including the right to assess upon and collect from its members such sums as are necessary, at any time, to liquidate its indebtedness; provided, a majority of the members present at any regular meeting duly called for such purpose, shall so vote; 'so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

This society shall have all the powers and privileges and be subject to all the liabilities and restrictions usually granted to and imposed upon similar societies; including the right to assess upon and collect from its members such sums as are necessary, at any time, to liquidate its
