Chapter 231.**CHAP. 231**

Resolve authorizing the Governor and Council to adjust with Francis A. Reed, a note held by the state against him.

Resolved, That the governor and council be, and hereby are authorized to adjust with Francis A. Reed, in accordance with justice and equity, a note held by the state against him, for the sum of three thousand eighty-five dollars and sixty cents.

Chapter 232.

Resolve in favor of township Number One, North Division, county of Penobscot.

Resolved, That the sum of five hundred dollars be appropriated, to be expended under the direction of the county commissioners of the county of Penobscot, in building a road in said township number one, known as the Rocky Rips road, leading from the town of Lowell to the town of Greenbush, in said county.

Chapter 233.

Resolve in favor of John P. Webber.

Resolved, That the land agent be, and he is hereby authorized to convey to John P. Webber, lot numbered eleven in the fifth range of lots, in the east half of township number two in the fifth range, west from the east line of the state, in the county of Aroostook, known as Silver Ridge plantation, waiving further settling duties, provided said Webber pay to the land agent, for the use of the state, the sum of twenty-five dollars.
