An act granting permission to S. E. Bryant, Anthony Luques, J. A. Wheeler and others, to locate and construct a Railroad from Kennebunk to Kennebunkport, in the county of York, upon certain conditions.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Permission is hereby granted to S. E. Bryant, Anthony S. E. Bryant et Luques, J. A. Wheeler, S. Brown, Charles C. Perkins, locate and con-George Hall, S. H. Gould, Charles E. Perkins, W. F. Moody, Charles O. Huff, J. G. Cousens, J. M. Emery, Woodbury Goodwin, L. L. Wormwood, George B. Carle, Daniel A. Burnham, Woodbury Smith, Joseph A. Titcomb, Charles Ward, W. G. Perkins, W. C. Parker, Edward E. Bourne, J. H. Ferguson, Joseph Sargent, Horatio Moody, M. C. Maling, H. T. Fairfield, and their associates, to locate and construct a railroad from Kennebunk to Kennebunkport, in the county of York, whenever they shall have been legally organized under chapter one hundred and twenty of the public laws of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and shall have complied with all the provisions thereof; provided, however, that this permission is granted Proviso. subject to the condition, that a suitable draw, such as shall be determined by the railroad commissioners to be necessary, shall be constructed and maintained in any bridge over tide waters where vessels can navigate.

Approved March 9, 1880.

Chapter 270.

An act to set off the homestead farm of Caleb Fuller, from the town of Woodstock, and annex the same to the town of Paris.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. The real estate of Caleb Fuller, being his home- certain real stead farm, in the town of Woodstock, in the county of Woodstock and Oxford, bounded and described as follows: beginning at a stake and stones on the Woodstock and Paris town line, at the southwest corner of said Caleb Fuller's land, and at the east line of land owned by C. D. Fickett, thence northerly on said Fickett's east line, to the old Paris and Woodstock
