CHAP. 79.

Chapter 79.

An act to prevent fishing in Pleasant Pond in the town of Garland, in the County of Penobscot.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Fishing in Pleasant pond, restricted.

SECT. 1. No person shall fish for, or take fish of any kind from Pleasant pond in the town of Garland, in the county of Penobscot, prior to the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

Penalty for violation.

SECT. 2. Any violation of this act shall be punished by a fine of five dollars, and an additional fine of one dollar for each fish so taken, one-half to go to the complainant, and the other half to go to the county of Penobscot.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Approved March 2, 1881.

Chapter 80.

An act to protect fish in Sabbath Day Pond and its tributaries in the town of New Gloucester.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Fishing in Sabbath Day pond, prohibited.

SECT. 1. All persons are prohibited from taking or catching any trout in Sabbath Day Pond and its tributaries in the town of New Gloucester, for the term of three years from the passage of this act.

Penalty for violation.

SECT. 2. Any person convicted of violation of this act, shall be fined ten dollars and costs of prosecution, one-half of the fine to go to the complainant, and one-half to the county of Cumberland.

Approved March 2, 1881.
