approved January twenty-nine, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven, are hereby authorized to take and hold any real and personal estate to the value of twenty thousand dollars in the manner and for the purposes specified in said act.

Approved March 10, 1883.

Chapter 338.

An Act authorizing the Governor and Council to adjust certain state taxes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Governor and council authorized to adjust taxes of Home Ins. Co. SECT. 1. The governor and council are hereby authorized and empowered to adjust, upon such terms as they may deem advisable for the interests of the state, all controversies and suits existing between the state of Maine and the Home Insurance Company, relating to the assessment and collection of its taxes.

SECT. 2. This act shall take affect when approved.

Chapter 339.

An Act to incorporate the Atlantic Telegraph Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

Corporate name Rights and privileges. SECT. 1. John Quimby, A. G. Prentiss, George F. Owen, S. I. Abbott, Fred Atwood, Weston Thompson and W. S. Dennett, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body corporate, by the name of the Atlantic Telegraph Company, with all the rights and privileges, and subject to all the duties provided by the general laws of this state, relating to corporations, with power by that name to sue and be sued, to have and use a common seal, and the same to change at pleasure; to establish any and all by-laws and regulations for the management of their affairs, not repug-
