Judge may order sale of property.

'Sect. 21. Upon application in writing, of any party interested, and notice to the debtor, the judge may order the messenger to sell, for cash, in such manner as he directs, any part of the debtor's estate; and in his own name, as messenger, to collect and receive debts due such insolvent; and such messenger shall keep a correct account of the names of the purchasers, the articles sold, and the prices received therefor, and of all debts collected by him.'

#### Chapter 321.

An Act to render more effective section one hundred twenty-six of chapter fifty-one of the Revised Statutes, relating to Accidents on Railroads.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Sec. 126, ch. 51, R. S., amended.

Commissioners may examine into cause of serious accidents, and include results in annual report.

-expenses of, how paid.

Section one hundred twenty-six of chapter fifty-one of the revised statutes is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SECT. 126. When a serious accident occurs to any train on a railroad, immediate notice thereof shall be given in writing by the officers of the company operating such railroad, to the chairman of the board of railroad commissioners, who shall, if he deems the public interest to require it, cause an investigation to be made at once by said board; and for such purpose any member of said board shall have power to send for such evidence as he believes necessary; and said commissioners shall, in their annual report, make a full statement of the cause of such accident. The expense of such investigation, including witness fees, shall be paid from the state treasury on certificate of the board of railroad Witnesses in all cases before said board commissioners. shall be allowed the same fees as in the supreme judicial court.'
