Chapter 224.

Resolves relating to United States appropriations for Indians.

Whereas, believing that the education of Indians and their Preamble. voluntary citizenship in the United States, will most justly, quickly, and economically solve the Indian problem, there-

Resolved, That the senators and representatives in congress, Indian policy. be, and they hereby are requested to aid in the passage of resolutions solemnly pledging the faith of the nation to the Indian policy embodied in the following principles:

That the unpaid sum pledged for educational pur- Purchase of stock, poses, by the government, as part payment for the cession of lands by Indians, be appropriated for the purchase of stock, farming implements and tools, for Indian manual labor schools.

That so much of the net proceeds of the sale of -education. public lands, as may be necessary, shall be set apart for the purpose of creating a permanent fund for the education of Indians.

That lands in severalty, making their titles ina-titles to lands and oltizenship. Third. lienable for twenty-five years, and United States citizenship may be granted at once to all Indians who so desire.

Resolved, That the governor be requested to transmit a Members of concopy of the foregoing resolutions to each of the senators and representatives in congress from this state.
