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## CHAP. 464

—may take land

the purpose of facilitating log driving from said pond to said Ellis river. And for said purpose, said corporation may take land and material along said stream, being accountable to the owners thereof for all reasonable damages suffered thereby.

May establish tolls.

SECT. 3. After said corporation shall have constructed said dams, and shall have made other improvements sufficient to make the stream floatable for log driving purposes, it may demand and receive twenty-five cents per thousand feet, board measure, for all logs, and two cents per cord for all pulp wood, which shall pass through or by its said works between the points named. And said corporation shall have a lien on said logs, pulp wood, or other timber, for said toll for ninety days after the same has been floated out of said stream into said Ellis river, to be enforced by attachment thereon.

Capital stock.

SECT. 4. The capital stock of said corporation shall not exceed two thousand dollars, to be divided into shares of fifty dollars each.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 5. For the purpose of organization, any one of the incorporators may notify each of the associates by letter, setting forth the time, purpose and place of said meeting, seven days at least before the date of said meeting.

SECT. 6. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 464.

An Act to prohibit the taking of fish from Woodsum's Brook, in the town of Waterborough.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

Taking of fish from Woodsum's brook, prohibited for five years.

SECT. 1. All persons are forbidden from taking fish of any kind from Woodsum's brook, so called, in the town of Waterborough, in York county, for the period of five years from the approval of this act.

Penalty for violation.

SECT. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this act shall be liable to a fine not to exceed ten dollars for each offense, to be recovered before any trial justice in York county, one-half to the complainant and one-half to the county of York.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 465.

An Act to incorporate the Lake Sebago Land Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. Payson Tucker, S. J. Anderson, Fred N. Dow, Benjamin F. Chadbourne, Tobias Lord, Junior, and W. F. Chadbourne, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby incorporated by the name of Lake Sebago Land Company, for the purpose of buying, selling, leasing and improving real estate.

Corporators.

Corporate name.

—purposes.

SECT. 2. Said corporation may for said purpose hold real and personal estate, not exceeding in amount two hundred thousand dollars.

May hold real estate.

SECT. 3. The capital stock of this corporation shall be one hundred thousand dollars, and shall be divided into shares of fifty dollars each. It may issue bonds to be secured by mortgage of all its property.

Capital stock.

—may issue bonds, and mortgage property.

SECT. 4. The first meeting may be called by a notice signed by any two of the corporators, and mailed to the others at least seven days before the day fixed for such meeting.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 466.

An Act for the protection of Pickerel in Little Sebago Pond.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. No pickerel shall be taken from Little Sebago pond or any of its tributaries, in the towns of Windham and Gray, in the county of Cumberland, with hook and line or in any other way, between the first day of October and the first day of June following, in each year, for a term of five years, commencing October first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine.

Taking of pickerel from Little Sebago pond, between Oct. 1 and June 1, prohibited for five years.
