Chapter 10.

Resolve in favor of Lola Coly.

Resolved, That the sum of one hundred dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated to pay Lola Coly, representative of the Penobscot tribe of Indians for his travel and attendance at this session of the legislature.

Lola Coly, in favor of.

Approved February 10, 1891.

Chapter 11.

Resolve in favor of the town of Detroit.

Resolved, That there be and is hereby appropriated the sum of three thousand dollars to the town of Detroit, for aid in building a bridge across the Sebasticook river.

Town of Detroit, in favor of.

Approved February 16, 1891.

Chapter 12.

Resolve in favor of the Temporary Home for Women and Children.

Resolved, That the sum of two thousand dollars be, and hereby is appropriated for the use of the Temporary Home for women and children at Deering, of which one thousand dollars shall be paid during the year eighteen hundred and ninety-one, and one thousand dollars during the year eighteen hundred and ninety-two.

Home for women and children, in favor of.

Approved February 16, 1891.

Chapter 13.

Resolve in favor of the Penobscot Tribe of Indians.

Resolved, That five per cent of the shore rentals of the Penobscot tribe of Indians for the year eighteen hundred and ninety be taken and expended for municipal purposes and that ten per cent be taken for the year eighteen hundred and ninety one for the same purpose, and that the same be expended in the years eighteen hundred and ninety-one and
