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Saturday in April and the other half on the amount so returned for the six months ending on the last Saturday in October; and such tax shall be paid semi-annually, within ten days after the first Mondays in June and December.

SECT. 3. All capital dues of such associations are exempt from municipal taxation to the association or to the shareholder, but real estate owned by the association, not held as collateral security, may be taxed by the town in which the same is located.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 275.

An Act to amend Section three of Chapter sixty-seven of the Revised Statutes, relating to Guardians.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

SECT. 1. Section three of chapter sixty-seven of the revised statutes is hereby amended by striking out all between the word "father" in the third line, and the word "shall" in the fifth line thereof, and substituting in place thereof the words "if competent, otherwise the mother if competent" so that said section as amended, shall read as follows:

Sec. 3. ch. 67, R.  
S. amended.

SECT. 3. Such guardian shall have the care and management of all his ward's estate and continue in office, until the ward is twenty one years of age, unless sooner lawfully discharged, but the father if competent, otherwise the mother if competent, shall have the care of the person and education of the minor; otherwise these duties devolve on the guardian; and in any case the judge may decree them to him if he deems it for the welfare of the minor, until his further order.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.
