#### Chapter 405.

An Act in relation to the Bath Military and Naval Orphan Asylum.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section six of chapter one hundred and sixty three of the Sec. 6 ch. 163, private and special laws of eighteen hundred and sixty six, is Special Laws, 1866, amended. hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Upon the final execution of the purpose herein Descendants of specified as the object of this incorporation, viz: the support have precidence. and education of the orphans and half orphans of persons engaged in the service of the United States during the recent rebellion, said asylum shall continue the exercise of its corporate powers as an institution for the education and support of, first, the descendants of veterans who resided and served on the quota of Maine in the late civil war; second, the orphans or half orphans of veterans residing in the state although not serving on the quota of Maine.'

Approved February 17, 1893.

#### Chapter 406.

An Act to prevent throwing waste and refuse lumber into Webb's River in Carthage.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. No person or persons shall throw or put into Throwing of Webb's river in Carthage, any waste or refuse lumber, excepting planer shavings and saw dust.

Any person who violates the provisions of section one, shall be subject to a penalty of not less than five dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars, to be recovered in an action of debt by any party injured, or by indictment.
