Chapter 540.

An Act to incorporate the Newfield Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.

SECT. 1. F. W. Smith, L. O. Straw, A. Towle, A. K. P. Davis, J. W. Murphy, W. M. Tibbetts, J. M. Moulton, W. Falker, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body corporate, by the name of the Newfield Telephone and Telegraph Company, with all the powers, rights and privileges, and subject to all the duties and obligations granted and prescribed by the general laws of this state relating to corporations; with power by that name to sue and be sued; to have and use a common seal, to establish any and all by-laws and regulations for the management of their affairs not repugnant to the laws of this state, and to do and perform any and all other legal and lawful acts, incident to similar corporations.

Authorized to construct telephone and telegraph lines.
—route.

SECT. 2. Said corporation shall have the right to own, locate, construct, maintain and operate telephone and telegraph lines from any point or points in Newfield to any point or points in Limerick, in the county of York.

May construct line along any public way.

SECT. 3. Said company shall have the right, within the limits aforesaid, to locate, construct and maintain its line upon and along any public way or bridge, but in such manner as not to incommode or endanger the customary use of such way or bridge. With the right to remove obstacles when necessary, within the limits aforesaid, except ornamental, fruit or shade trees, and with the power to establish and collect tolls on said line, provided, that the rights to construct and maintain said lines shall be subject to the provisions of chapter three hundred and seventy-eight, public laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-five, and all rights and powers granted by this act shall be exercised in accordance with said chapter three hundred and seventy-eight.

Authorized to connect with, lease or sell to another company.

SECT. 4. Said corporation is hereby authorized to connect its line or lines with those of any other company, or to sell or lease its line either before or after completion to any other telephone or telegraph company, upon such terms as may be mutually agreed upon, which sale or lease shall be binding upon the parties; or to purchase or to lease any other line

or lines of telephone or telegraph, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreed upon.

SECT. 5. The amount of capital stock shall be fixed by vote of the corporation, but not to exceed four thousand dollars, and said corporation may purchase, hold, sell and convey real estate and personal property necessary for the purposes contemplated in this charter.

Capital stock.

SECT. 6. Any one of the corporators named in this act, may call the first meeting of this company by mailing a written notice to each of the other corporators, seven days at least, before the day of meeting, naming the time, place and purposes of such meeting; and at such meeting, a president, secretary, treasurer and directors may be chosen, by-laws adopted, and any corporate business transacted.

SECT. 7. This charter shall be null and void, unless operations shall actually commence hereunder within two years from date of the passage of this act.

When charter shall be void.

SECT. 8. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 541.

An Act to incorporate the Lincoln Industrial and Educational Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Joseph Maddocks, John H. McClintock, J. F. Dunton, Albert Murray, Freeman Boynton, S. E. Nickerson, W. E. Lewis, George B. Kenniston, and R. G. Hodgdon, their associates and successors, are hereby created a corporation and body politic by the name of the Lincoln Industrial and Educational Association, to be established and maintained in the town of Boothbay Harbor, in the county of Lincoln, for the promotion of education, literature and science, the same to be non-sectarian in character.

Corporators.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is hereby vested with all the powers, rights, privileges and immunities incident to similar corporations, may have and use a common seal, prosecute and defend suits at law, make and establish by-laws and regulations for the management of its affairs and the proper government of the academy, not repugnant to the constitu-
