CHAP. 577**Chapter 577.**

An Act for the protection of Trout and land-locked Salmon in Little Rattlesnake Pond and its tributaries in the town of Raymond, in Cumberland county.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Taking of fish from Little Rattlesnake pond for four years, prohibited.

SECT. 1. All persons are forbidden fishing for, or taking in any manner, any trout or land-locked salmon from Little Rattlesnake pond or any of its tributaries, in the town of Raymond, county of Cumberland, for the period of four years.

Penalty.

SECT. 2. Whoever violates the provisions of this act, shall be liable to a penalty of five dollars for each and every trout or land-locked salmon so taken, to be recovered on complaint before any trial justice in said county, one-half to the use of the complainant and one-half to the use of the county.

Chapter 578

An Act for the better protection of fish in Burnt Land Pond in the town of Deer Isle, in Hancock County.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Taking of fish from Burnt Land pond for five years, prohibited.

SECT. 1. No person shall fish for or take fish of any kind, from Burnt Land pond, in the town of Deer Isle, in Hancock county, for the term of five years.

Penalty.

SECT. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this act shall be punished by a fine of five dollars for each offense, and five dollars additional for each fish taken, to be recovered by complaint before any trial justice in the town of Deer Isle, one-half to the use of the prosecutor, and one-half to the town of Deer Isle, or by imprisonment not more than sixty days.
