Sec. 4, repealed.

SECT. 2. Section four of the said original act of incorporation approved February fourteenth, eighteen hundred eighty-three is hereby repealed.

SECT. 3. This act shall not be construed as repealing section five of chapter seventy-four of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred eighty-seven.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 621.

An Act for the better protection of trout in Mud Pond, so called, in Township Two, Range Four, Franklin County.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Close time for
fish in Mud pond,
between Oct.
1 and May 1.

SECT. 1. No person shall take, kill, catch or fish for any trout, or any other fish in Mud pond, in Township two, range four in Franklin county, between the first days of October and May following in each year.

Penalty.

SECT. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this act shall be liable to a fine of not more than ten dollars for each offense, and a further fine of one dollar for each fish so taken, to be recovered before any trial justice in Franklin county, one-half to the complainant and one-half to the county of Franklin.
