Chapter 63.

An Act to abate taxes on township number four, range five, west of Kennebec River,
in Somerset County.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

One hundred and nine dollars and seventy cents of the state tax for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and ninety-nine dollars and seventy-three cents of the state tax for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, on township number four, range five, west of Kennebec river, in Somerset county, are hereby abated.

Chapter 64.

An Act to authorize Charles Forster to dam the waters of the outlet of Jennie Pond
located in the towns of Mexico and Carthage.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. Charles Forster, his heirs and assigns are hereby authorized to dam the waters of the outlet of Jennie pond, located in the towns of Mexico and Carthage, to a point not exceeding three feet above extreme high water mark.

SECT. 2. All persons or corporations who shall sustain any damages in consequence of the flowage of water in said Jennie pond, shall receive a fair and equitable compensation therefor; and if any person sustaining damages as aforesaid, and said Charles Forster, shall not mutually agree upon the sum to be paid therefor, such person may cause his damages to be assessed in the same manner and under the same conditions and limitations as are by law provided in the case of damages by the laying out of public highways.
