Chapter 139.

An Act to restore certain territory to South Paris Village Corporation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Territory
restored to
village
corporation.

SECT. 1. So much of the territory set off from the South Paris Village Corporation, by act of the legislature, approved February six, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, as is described in said act as the estate of Richard Lombard, is hereby restored to, and made a part of said South Paris Village Corporation.

Shall be sub-
ject to all
liabilities, of
corporation.

SECT. 2. Said territory, with all residents thereon, shall become by this act, a constituent part of said South Paris Village Corporation, subject to all the present and future liabilities of said corporation, the same as if said set off had never been made.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 140.

An Act to organize the Plantation of Carrying Place.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Plantation
organized.

SECT. 1. Township number one in the third range west of Kennebec river, in Bingham's Kennebec Purchase, in the county of Somerset, is hereby organized into a plantation by the name of Carrying Place, and is hereby invested with all the powers and privileges and subjected to all the duties and obligations incident to other organized plantations.

Made the
legal succes-
sor of former
plantation.

SECT. 2. Said plantation is hereby made the legal successor of the former plantation of Carrying Place and is invested with all the corporate property of said former plantation and authorized to assume and pay the debts thereof and to raise money by tax for that purpose.

Existing
organization
confirmed.

SECT. 3. The organization of the existing plantation of Carrying Place is hereby confirmed and made valid and the first annual meeting called by the assessors thereof after the

passage of this act shall be the first meeting of the plantation hereby organized.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 141.

An Act to amend chapter five hundred and eighty-seven, Private and Special Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, entitled "An Act to protect fish in Quimby Pond, Franklin County."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Section one of chapter five hundred eighty-seven of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three is hereby amended by adding after the word "mode" in the fourth line, the following words 'of angling with rod and artificial flies,' and adding to said section the following words 'and it shall also be unlawful for any person to catch, kill or carry away from said pond, more than twenty-five pounds of trout and salmon in any one day,' so that said section shall read as follows :

Sec. 1, ch. 687,

'SECT. 1. It shall be unlawful to take, catch, kill or fish for land-locked salmon, trout, or other fish in Quimby pond in the town of Rangeley, and county of Franklin, except in the ordinary mode of angling with rod and artificial flies, between sunrise and sunset, in each day from the fifteenth day of May to the first day of October in each year, and it shall also be unlawful for any person to catch, kill or carry away from said pond more than twenty-five pounds of trout and salmon in any one day.'

Taking of fish

and Oct. 1,
except with
rod and flies,
prohibited.
