CHAP. 165

Chapter 165.

An Act for the better protection of Deer in the county of Sagadahoc.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Killing of deer, in Sagadahoc Co., prohibited for four years. §3

—penalty.

SECT. 1. Whoever in any manner or at any time within four years of the approval of this act shall hunt, chase, catch, kill or destroy any deer within the county of Sagadahoc, forfeits forty dollars for each deer so hunted, chased, killed or destroyed.

Provisions of ch. 30, R. S., made applicable.

SECT. 2. All the provisions of chapter thirty of the revised statutes relating to deer, not inconsistent with this act, are hereby made a part of this act.

Chapter 166.

An Act to prohibit the taking of trout and salmon from Long Pond Stream and Vaughan Stream in Piscataquis County.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Taking of fish in certain streams, prohibited for ten years.

—penalty.

SECT. 1. No person shall take, catch, kill or fish for any trout, togue or land-locked salmon in Long Pond stream, so called, or Vaughau stream, so called, in Piscataquis county, being streams which flow into Lake Onaway, for a period of ten years.

SECT. 2. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this act shall be subject to the penalties provided in chapter forty of the revised statutes.

Approved March 14, 1895.
