Chapter 223.

An Act to legalize and make valid the acts of the town of Fayette.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Doings of
town, made
valid.

SECT. 1. The acts and doings of the town of Fayette, at its annual meetings held in March, in the years eighteen hundred and ninety, eighteen hundred and ninety-one, eighteen hundred and ninety-two, eighteen hundred and ninety-three and eighteen hundred and ninety-four in pursuance of the respective warrants, calling said meetings, are hereby made legal and valid, notwithstanding any defect, or omission in any date in said warrants.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 224.

An Act to allow the Velasco Company to purchase, hold and dispose of the stock of other corporations.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Powers of
Velasco Co.,
enlarged.

The Velasco Company, organized under the general laws of this state, is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase, hold, use and dispose of the stock and bonds of corporations organized under the laws of this or other states for the purpose of engaging in business similar to, auxiliary to, relating to, or necessary for the business described in the articles of association and certificate of organization of said Velasco Company.
