to said action and intends in good faith to make such defence and claims a jury trial, the said action shall be removed into and entered at the next term of the superior court for said And the judge of said municipal court on payment to him of the entry fee in said superior court by the plaintiff, shall forthwith cause the original writ and all other papers in the case to be filed in the clerk's office of said superior court. Any party may appeal from any judgment or sentence of said municipal court to the superior court in the same manner as from a judgment of a trial justice. The costs and fees allowed to parties and attorneys in civil actions before said court, in which the debt or damages recovered do not exceed twenty dollars shall be the same as are allowed before trial justices. except that the plaintiff, if he prevails, shall be allowed two dollars for his writ, and the defendant, if he prevails, shall be allowed one dollar for his pleadings. In all actions in which the amount recovered exceeds twenty dollars, the costs and fees of parties and attorneys shall be the same as in the superior

Chapter 328.

An Act to repeal Chapter five hundred and three of the Private and Special Laws of eighteen hundred and twenty-eight, to regulate the taking of fish in Narraguagus River.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Chapter 503, private laws 1828, repealed. Chapter five hundred and three of private acts of eighteen hundred and twenty-eight is hereby repealed, and all acts amendatory thereto.
