Section 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 69.

An Act to amend Chapter one hundred and ninety-four of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and one entitled, "An Act additional to Chapter twenty-nine of the Reylsed Statutes, relating to Bowling Alleys."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Chapter 194, public laws of 1901, amended. Section I. Chapter one hundred and ninety-four of the public laws of nineteen hundred and one is hereby amended by inserting after the word "alleys" in the second and fifth line the words 'pool, bagatelle and billiard rooms' so that said section as amended, shall read as follows:

Permission may be given to keep open till midnight. 'Section 1. Any person licensed to own, keep and operate a bowling alley, or bowling alleys, pool, bagatelle or billiard rooms in this state under the provisions of chapter twenty-nine of the revised statutes, may be granted permission by the municipal officers of the town or city where said bowling alley or alleys, pool, bagatelle or billiard rooms are situated to keep the same open until midnight, when in the opinion of such municipal officers no person or persons residing in the immediate neighborhood will be disturbed thereby.'

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.
