board, and shall also, in like manner, determine the manner of calling special meetings and the persons by whom the same shall be called; but until otherwise provided by ordinance special meetings shall be called by the mayor by causing a notification to be left at the usual residence or place of business of each member of the board or boards to be convened.'

Section 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 69.

An Act to extend the charter of the Sanford Trust Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Charter extended for two years.

Section 1. The rights, powers and privileges of the Sanford Trust Company which were granted by chapter four hundred and sixty-nine, of the private and special laws of one thousand nine hundred and one, are hereby extended for two years from the approval of this act and the persons named in said act, their associates and successors shall have all the rights, powers and privileges that were granted them by said act to be exercised in the same manner and for the same purposes as specified in said act.

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 70.

An Act for the better protection of Shell Fish within the town of Georgetown.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Shell fish shall not be taken in the town of Georgetown without written permit.

—proviso.

Section 1. No shell fish shall be taken from any flats within the limits of the town of Georgetown, in Sagadahoc county, except by written permit of the municipal officers of the town and payment to the town for the privilege at such price as said town may establish at any town meeting, any existing law to the contrary notwithstanding; provided, that without such permit, any inhabitant within said town, or any person temporarily resident therein, or the riparian owner of such flats, may take there-

from for the immediate use of himself or his family, not exceeding one bushel at any one tide.

Section 2. Any person taking shell fish contrary to the provisions of this act, shall be punished for each offense by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both, and it shall be the duty of the municipal officers of Georgetown to make complaint for any violation of this act.

Chapter 71.

An Act to amend Chapter three hundred and forty-six of the Private and Special Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, entitled "An Act to amend the charter of the City of Westbrook."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section two of chapter three hundred and forty-six of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, entitled "An Act to amend the charter of the City of Westbrook," is hereby amended by striking out the words "second Monday in March" in the third sentence of said section, and inserting in place thereof the words 'first Monday in January.'

Section 2 of chapter 346 of special laws of 1897, amended.

Chapter 72.

An Act to authorize the Augusta, Winthrop and Gardiner Railway to supply electricity in the towns of Winthrop and Manchester.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. The Augusta, Winthrop and Gardiner Railway is hereby authorized to make, generate, sell, distribute and supply electricity for lighting, heating, manufacturing and mechanical purposes in the towns of Winthrop and Manchester, and in so doing shall have all the rights and be subject to all the duties and liabilities of corporations exercising similar powers under the general laws of the state.

Augusta, Winthrop and Gardiner Railway authorized to supply electricity to towns of Winthrop and Manchester.

Section 2. The said company is authorized to make contracts with the towns of Winthrop and Manchester, and any village corporation therein, and with corporations and inhabitants of said towns for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power

May make contracts with Winthrop and Manchester to supply electricity.
