### Chapter 306.

An Act in relation to the Bath Military and Naval Orphan Asylum.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Section 1. Chapter one hundred and sixty-three of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-six is hereby amended by adding the following section:

'Section 7. The trustees are authorized and empowered, at their discretion, to admit to the Home, children or grandchildren of the veterans of the civil war when they have been deserted by either of their parents, also orphans or half orphans of veterans of the Spanish war who were residents of Maine, also orphans of any citizens of Maine, should the capacity of the Home, at any time, be more than sufficient to care for orphans eligible for admittance under the preceding section of this chapter.'

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 307.

An Act opening certain tributaries to Sebec lake to fishing under the general law.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Section 1. It shall be lawful to fish for, take, catch and kill fish, in accordance with the general law of the state, in all of the streams flowing into Sebec lake, in Piscataquis county, except Wilson stream and Ship pond stream.
