Chapter 350.

An Act to regulate fishing in the tributaries of Wilson lake in Wilton, in the County of Franklin.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. So much of section five of chapter forty-two of the public laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine as prohibits fishing in the tributaries of Wilson lake in Wilton, in the county of Franklin, except in Coos brook from its entrance into said Wilson lake to the upper side of the Wilkins bridge over said Coos brook, and the Holland brook from its junction with Coos brook to the upper side of the Coos bridge over said Holland brook, is hereby repealed.

Fishing in tributaries of Wilson lake, prohibition repealed.

—exceptions.

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Approved March 27, 1903.

Chapter 351.

An Act to prohibit all ice fishing in Lake Webb or Weld pond, so called, in the town of Weld, County of Franklin.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish in Lake Webb or Weld pond, so called, in the town of Weld, Franklin county, between October first and May first of the following year.

Ice fishing in Weld pond, prohibited.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than thirty dollars and costs for each offense and a further fine of one dollar for each fish caught, taken or killed in violation of this law.

Penalty.
