private and special law, or other law, relating to unmarked logs, sometimes called "prizes," or logs or other lumber, the ownership of which cannot be ascertained, upon the waters of said Penobscot river or any of its tributaries above said Penobscot boom inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.

Section 7. Whoever, except as provided in this act, takes, carries away or otherwise converts to his own use any such logs or other lumber without marks or means by which their ownership can be ascertained, after they shall have become intermingled with the logs or other lumber of other owners for the purposes of driving as aforesaid, suitable to be manufactured into lumber or pulp, lying in said Penobscot river, or in any of the waters tributary to said Penobscot river, above said Penobscot boom, or on or near the bank or shore thereof, or puts any mark upon the same with intent to claim the same for himself or another, forfeits for every such log or stick twenty dollars, to be recovered on complaint of any person or by indictment.

Penalty for taking away prize logs.

Section 8. The provisions of sections seven and eight of chapter forty-two of the revised statutes of eighteen hundred eighty-three, relating to logs and other lumber, carried by freshet on to lands, are not affected by this act.

Provisions not affected by this act.

Section 9. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 406.

An Act to prevent the throwing of sawdust and other mill waste into all tributaries of Seven Tree pond and Crawford pond in Union and Warren.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. No person or persons shall put, or allow the same to be done by any person within his employ, any sawdust, shavings, bark, or other mill waste, into any of the tributaries of Seven Tree pond, in Union, in the county of Knox, or in any of the tributaries of Crawford pond, in Union and Warren, in said Knox county, or place or deposit such mill waste, or other refuse, along the banks in such a manner that the same shall fall or be washed into said brooks or streams.

Throwing of refuse into Seven Tree pond or tributaries of Crawford pond, forbidden.

Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of section one of this act, shall be subject to a penalty of not less than five dollars and not more than fifty dollars and costs for each offense.

Penalty for violation.

Section 3. This act shall take effect January first, nineteen hundred and five.
