by issuing their warrant for the same seven days prior to the time of said meeting, which shall be holden in the month of March of the present year.

Property of plantation shall vest in town.

Section 3. The town hereby created shall be possessed of all the property and effects belonging to said plantation, and shall assume all the liabilities thereof.

Section 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 125.

An Act in relation to the lands reserved for public uses in the Plantation of Kingsbury.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Land agent authorized to sell lands reserved for public uses in plantation of Kingsbury.

Disposition of proceeds of sale.

Section I. The land agent is hereby authorized and directed, upon payment to him of the sum of two thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars, to sell and convey all of the lands reserved for public uses in the plantation of Kingsbury, and to release all actions or causes of action which the state now has or might have for all trespasses heretofore committed upon said lands. An instrument of conveyance similar in form to that usually adopted by the agent in the conveyance of public lands, shall, when duly executed and delivered by said land agent, be sufficient to convey title to such lands and to effectuate such release.

Section 2. The proceeds of such sale and release, less all expenses, costs and expenditures incurred by the land agent in the recovery thereof and in connection therewith, shall be deposited with the treasurer of the state to the credit of the school fund of said plantation of Kingsbury.

Section 3. This act shall take effect when approved.
