CHAP. 67**Chapter 67.**

An Act to amend Section one of Chapter fifty-seven of the Revised Statutes, relating to organization of Corporations.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Section 1,  
chapter 57,  
R. S.,  
amended.

Section 1. Section one of chapter fifty-seven of the revised statutes as amended by chapter seventy-two of the public acts of nineteen hundred and five is hereby further amended by inserting after the word "degree" in the third line the words 'as a Masonic association consisting of members of different orders or degrees'; also by inserting after the word "society" in the eighth and ninth lines thereof the words 'as an association for the promotion of good municipal government,' so that the said section as amended, shall read as follows:

Libraries  
and societies  
for certain  
charitable,  
literary,  
social and

'Section 1. When seven or more persons desire to be incorporated as proprietors of a social, military, literary, scientific or county law library; as a masonic lodge or chapter of any order or degree; as a masonic association consisting of members of different orders or degrees; as a lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows; as a division of the Sons of Temperance; as a tent of the Rechabites; as a grange of Patrons of Husbandry; as a council of the Sovereigns of Industry; as a Grand Army post; as a relief or benefit association for mutual assistance; as a monument or memorial association; as a society to promote temperance; as a village improvement society; as an association for the promotion of good municipal government; as a yacht club, or for any literary, scientific, musical, charitable, educational, social, military, agricultural, moral, religious or benevolent purpose; they may apply in writing to any justice of the peace in the county, who may issue his warrant, directed to one of said applicants, requiring him to call a meeting thereof at such time and place as the justice may appoint.'

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Approved March 15, 1907.
