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**Chapter 115.**

An Act to preserve the purity of the source of water supply for the village of Buckfield and to protect the public health.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Section 1. No structure, cesspool, privy or outhouse shall hereafter be erected or maintained within the distance of two hundred feet of the waters of North pond, so called, in the towns of Sumner and Buckfield in the county of Oxford, the source of the water supply for the village of Buckfield.

Buildings not to be erected within certain distance of North pond.

Section 2. No sewage, drainage, refuse or polluting matter of such kind and amount, as either by itself or in connection with other matter, will corrupt or impair the quality of the waters of said North pond or render it injurious to health, shall be discharged into said pond, or put upon the ice thereon, but nothing herein shall prohibit the cultivation and use of the soil in the ordinary methods of agriculture if no human excrement is used thereon within three hundred feet of said pond.

No sewage to be discharged into North pond.

Section 3. The supreme judicial court shall have jurisdiction in equity to enjoin, prevent or restrain any violation of the provisions of this act.

Supreme judicial court to have jurisdiction.

Section 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

**Chapter 116.**

An Act to amend Section one of Chapter one hundred sixty-six of the Private and Special Laws of eighteen hundred eighty-seven as amended by Chapter three hundred three of Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred five, relating to Fort Fairfield Village Corporation.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Section 1. Section one of chapter one hundred sixty-six of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred eighty-seven as amended by chapter three hundred and three of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and five is hereby further amended by inserting in line two thereof, after the word "three" the words 'except so much of said lot three as is now embraced in the farm of W. Holman Fisher,' so that said section as amended, shall read as follows:

Section 1, chapter 166, private and special laws, 1887, as amended by chapter 303, private and special laws, 1905, further amended.

'Section 1. The following described territory, namely: Lots numbered two, three, except so much of said lot three as is now embraced in the farm of W. Holman Fisher, eight, nine, ten, eleven, twelve, thirteen, fourteen, fifteen and seventy-nine, in the

town of Fort Fairfield according to Sawyer's survey of township letter D in the first range, together with the inhabitants therein, be, and the same are hereby created a body politic and corporate by the name of the Fort Fairfield Village Corporation.'

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 117.

An Act authorizing the Umbagog Paper Company to locate, erect and maintain piers and booms in the Kennebec River.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Umbagog Paper Co., authorized to maintain piers and booms.

Section 1. The Umbagog Paper Company, its successors and assigns, are hereby authorized and empowered to locate, erect and maintain in the Kennebec river, between Caratunk falls in the towns of Embden and Solon and the Ellis farm, so called, in the town of Concord, piers and booms for the purpose of collecting, holding and sorting logs, pulp wood and other lumber coming down said Kennebec river. Said works shall be so constructed as to provide for the prompt and convenient passage of all logs, pulp wood and other lumber that may come within the same, without unreasonable or unnecessary delay; and it shall be the duty of said Umbagog Paper Company to sort and turn out at least thirty thousand logs per day on the average, each week, through said booms, when there is that number therein; but in case said Umbagog Paper Company does not sort and turn out the required number, the Kennebec Log Driving Company, upon notice to said Umbagog Paper Company in writing, left at its office, shall have the right to put men of its own selection upon said booms at the charge and expense of said Umbagog Paper Company, in order that the required number of logs may be put through the same; but nothing herein contained shall make said Umbagog Paper Company liable for any delay caused by said piers and booms except as herein otherwise specified. Any stray logs, pulp wood or other lumber not destined for use and manufacture at the mills of said Umbagog Paper Company, if found in the storage booms of said Umbagog Paper Company, shall be turned out thereof by said Umbagog Paper Company, at its own charge and expense, upon demand in writing of the owners thereof, or of said Kennebec Log Driving Company. All damages for flowage caused by the construction of said piers and booms shall be determined by the county commissioners of Somerset county.
