CHAP. 121**Chapter 121.**

An Act to authorize John H. Walker to extend and maintain a wharf in Squa Pan Lake.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

John H. Walker authorized to extend wharf in Squa Pan lake.

Section 1. John H. Walker and his assigns are hereby authorized to erect and maintain piers and floating wharf for a steamer landing at the head of Squa Pan lake in township number eleven, range four, Aroostook county.

Not to extend into a depth of more than four feet of water.

Said piers and wharf not to extend into a depth of more than four feet of water at low water. Said piers and wharf to extend into said Squa Pan lake from land now occupied by John H. Walker and leased from David Pingree and Ann Maria Wheatland of Salem, Massachusetts, and Ann P. Peabody of Boston, Massachusetts, and E. and I. K. Stetson and T. N. Coe of Bangor, Maine; provided, however, that when the leasehold interest of said Walker and his assigns in the land on the shore of said lake, on which said wharf abuts, shall cease, the right to maintain said wharf shall cease.

—proviso.

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 122.

An Act to authorize the State Land Agent to sell Little Island in Mosquito Harbor in the town of Saint George.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Land Agent authorized to sell Little Island.

Section 1. The state land agent is hereby authorized to sell and convey to Elbridge C. Cook of Saint George the island known as Little island, situate at the entrance of Mosquito harbor, in the town of Saint George, containing about one-sixth of an acre.

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.
