Chapter 382.

An Act to regulate fishing in Wesserunsett stream and tributaries, in the County of Somerset.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in Wesserunsett stream, so called, in the county of Somerset, or in any of its tributaries, for a period of five years from May first, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and seven.

Close time for fishing in Wesserunsett stream and tributaries.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to a penalty of not less than ten dollars nor more than thirty dollars and costs for each offense and a further penalty of one dollar for each fish taken, caught, killed or had in possession in violation of the provisions hereof.

Penalty for violation of this act.

Chapter 383.

An Act to repeal Chapter five hundred eighty-two of the Special Laws of eighteen hundred sixty-eight, and Chapter one hundred ninety-one of the Special Laws of nineteen hundred three, relating to the taking of Codfish, Pollock, Hake and Haddock in the waters of Frenchmen's Bay.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter five hundred eighty-two of the special laws of eighteen hundred sixty-eight and chapter one hundred ninety-one of the special laws of nineteen hundred three, both entitled, "An Act to regulate the taking of codfish, pollock, hake and haddock in the waters of Frenchmen's bay," are hereby repealed.

Chapter 582, special laws 1868, and chapter 191, special laws 1903, repealed.

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.
