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CHAP. 118**Chapter 118.**

Resolve in favor of Benjamin F. Brown.

Benjamin

in favor of.

*Resolved*, That there be allowed and paid out of the treasury of the state to Benjamin F. Brown of South Gardiner, a pension of eight dollars per month, beginning January first, nineteen hundred and seven, and to continue during the pleasure of the legislature.

**Chapter 119.**

Resolve in favor of the Town of Isle au Haut.

Town of  
Isle au Haut,  
in favor of.

*Resolved*, That the state land agent be, and he is hereby authorized and empowered, upon receipt of a nominal consideration of one dollar, to make, execute and deliver a deed to the inhabitants of the town of Isle au Haut, Hancock county, Maine, releasing and conveying to said town all right, title and interest of the state in and to all tracts of land in said town denominated public landings, or landing places on the plan of said town made by Lothrop Lewis.

**Chapter 120.**

Resolve in favor of Louis D. Greenwood.

*Resolved*, That the sum of twenty-two dollars, be and is hereby appropriated to Louis D. Greenwood who is a seaman in the naval reserves of the National Guard of the state of Maine.

**Chapter 121.**

Resolves proposing an amendment to Article four of the Constitution of the State of Maine, establishing a people's veto through the optional referendum, and a direct initiative by petition and at general or special elections.

Constitutional

*Resolved*, That the following amendment to the constitution of this state be proposed for the action of the legal voters of this state in the manner provided by the constitution, to wit:

Part first of  
article four  
amended.

Part first of article four is hereby amended as follows, namely: By striking out all of section one after the word "Maine" in the third line thereof, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words, 'but the people reserve to themselves power to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls independent of
