### Онар. 125

#### Chapter 125.

An Act to amend Section one of Chapter one hundred and seventy-one of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and seven, relating to the State Superintendent of Public Schools.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1, chapter 171, public laws of 1907, amended. Section I. Section one of chapter one hundred and seventy-one of the public laws of nineteen hundred and seven is hereby amended by inserting after the word "purpose" in line five of said section the words 'he shall employ a clerk, who may serve as his deputy, at a salary not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars annually, with necessary expenses when on official business within the state, and other clerical assistance at a cost not to exceed one thousand dollars annually,' so that said section, when amended, shall read as follows:

Salary of state superintendent of schools.

—may employ clerk who may act as deputy.

-salary.

'Section I. The salary of the state superintendent of schools is hereby established at twenty-five hundred dollars per annum. He shall receive in addition his actual cash expenses incurred in the performance of his official duties which sum shall be paid out of the specific appropriation for that purpose. He shall employ a clerk, who may serve as his deputy, at a salary not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars annually, with necessary expenses when on official business within the state, and other clerical assistance at a cost not to exceed one thousand dollars annually. He shall perform his official duties at the office provided for him at the seat of government and not elsewhere, not meaning, however, to prohibit him from making such necessary journeys and performing such duties as are necessary or incidental to the immediate object of such journey.'

Section 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.

#### Chapter 126.

An Act relating to the powers of the Board of Prison and Jail Inspectors.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 12, chapter 141, R. S., amended.

Inspectors may make recommendations to co. commissioners or sheriff, etc. Section twelve of chapter one hundred and forty-one of the revised statutes is hereby amended by adding to said section the following:

'Said inspectors may, from time to time, make such recommendations as to them seem reasonable and proper, to the commissioners of any county, or to the sheriff thereof, or to the keeper of the jail therein, as to enlargement, alteration or
