Chapter 170.

An Act to regulate fishing in the tributaries to Phillips Lake, in the county of Hancock.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section I. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in Rowe brook, sometimes called Schoolhouse brook, Allen brook, Intervale brook, Hurd brook or Mountain brook, all of which brooks flow into Phillips lake, so called, in the county of Hancock, or in any other tributaries to said Phillips lake, except on Wednesday and Saturday of each week, on which days it shall be lawful to fish in said brooks in accordance with the general law of the state.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for illegal fishing for and catching trout and land-locked salmon.

Section 3. In all prosecutions arising under this act, munici- Court Jurispal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have upon complaint original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 171.

An Act to regulate fishing in Kennebago Stream, so called, situated partly in Franklin County and partly in Oxford County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section I. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish in Kennebago stream, so called, from In-

—may take two fish in one day. dian Rock, so called, to the Big Falls, so called, in said stream, except in the ordinary way of casting with artificial flies or fly fishing. It shall be unlawful for any person to kill when so fishing in any one day more than two fish taken within the limits of said Kennebago stream above described, and then only when accompanied by a registered guide.

Penalty for violation of this act.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching trout and land-locked salmon.

Court jurisdiction. Section 3. In all prosecutions arising under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 172.

An Act to regulate fishing through the ice in Webber Pond, in the County of Kennebec.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Ice fishing in Webber pond, regulated.

Section I. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish through the ice in Webber pond, in the county of Kennebec, except it shall be lawful to fish through the ice in said pond in accordance with the general law of the state, on Tuesday and Saturday of each week. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching trout and land-locked salmon.

Court jurisdiction. Section 2. In all prosecutions arising under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.
