Penalty.

Section 3. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching trout and land-locked salmon.

Jurisdiction of courts.

Section 4. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties, shall have upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 215.

An Act authorizing the payment of an annuity by the city of Portland to John Cousens.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Annuity to John Cousens, authorized.

The city council of the city of Portland may annually hereafter appropriate and pay to John Cousens, a former member of the fire department of said city, who received injuries while in the discharge of his duty, a sum not exceeding four hundred and seventy-five dollars.

Chapter 216.

An Act to regulate fishing in Little Big Wood Pond, Somerset County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Ice fishing in Little Big Wood pond, prohibited for 5 years.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish in Little Big Wood pond, so called, in Somerset county, through the ice, for a period of five years from the time this act takes effect.

Penalty.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for illegal fishing.

Jurisdiction of courts.

Section 3. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices in their respective counties shall have upon complaint original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme judicial and superior courts, and all fines, forfeit-

ures and penalties received for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 217.

An Act to regulate ice fishing in Pattie's Pond, in Winslow, in Kennebec County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish through the ice in Pattie's pond, so called, in Winslow, in the county of Kennebec, except on Tuesday and Saturday of each week, on which days it shall be lawful to fish in said pond in accordance with the general law of the state. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching trout and land-locked salmon.

Section 2. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties, shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 218.

An Act to extend the charter of the Searsport Trust Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

All the rights, powers and privileges of the Searsport Trust Company which were granted by chapter two hundred and seventy-nine of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and five, are hereby extended for one year; provided, however, that said company shall actually commence business as a trust company within said one year.
