CHAP. 222

Chapter 222.

An Act to authorize Cora B. Norris to build and maintain wharves and piers in Cochnewagan Lake in Monmouth.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Cora B. Norris authorized to erect wharves and piers in Lake Cochnewagan.

Cora B. Norris is hereby authorized to erect, maintain and control wharves and piers from her shore front into Lake Cochnewagan in Monmouth, Kennebec county, beginning at the south side of the channel at the dam and running south to her south line and extending into Cochnewagan lake one hundred feet, and have exclusive control of the same for her use and for the use of cottages now building and to be built.

Chapter 223.

An Act to regulate fishing in Pleasant Pond in Somerset County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Fishing in Pleasant pond, regulated.

Jurisdiction of courts.

—fines, how disposed of.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or for the occupants of any one boat to take, catch or kill more than ten pounds of fish in all in any one day in Pleasant pond, in the county of Somerset. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching trout and land-locked salmon.

Section 2. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties, shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 224.

An Act to prohibit ice fishing in the Prestile Stream in Aroostook County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Ice fishing in Prestile stream and tributaries, prohibited for 5 years.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any trout in Prestile stream which flows through the towns of Westfield, Mars Hall, Blaine and Bridgewater, or any of the tributaries thereof in the said towns or in any ponds flow-

ing into said stream from October first to May first of the following year for a period of five years from October first, nineteen hundred and nine.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than thirty dollars and costs for each offense, and a further penalty of one dollar for each such fish caught, taken or killed in violation of this act.

Penalty.

Section 3. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties, shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 225.

An Act to provide for ice fishing, in accordance with the general law of the state, in Spectacle, the Stanleys, Trafton and Jay Bird Ponds, in Oxford County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

So much of chapter four hundred and seven, section one, of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and three, as closes Spectacle pond, in Porter, and the Stanley ponds in Hiram, and Trafton and Jay Bird ponds, Oxford county, to fishing through the ice, as provided in the general law of the state, is hereby repealed.

Ice fishing in Spectacle, the Stanleys, Trafton and Jay Bird ponds, permitted.

Chapter 226.

An Act to incorporate the Guilford Water Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Henry A. Elliott and John S. Williams, both of Guilford, in the county of Piscataquis, and Fred C. Pooler of Skowhegan, in the county of Somerset, with their successors and associates, are hereby made a body corporate by the name of the Guilford Water Company, for the purpose of conveying to, and supplying the inhabitants of the said town of Guilford
