Chapter 249.

An Act to regulate fishing in Pierce pond, so called, in Somerset County.
Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Ice fishing
in Pierce
pond, pro-
hibited.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish through the ice in Pierce pond, so called, in Somerset county. It shall also be unlawful for any person to have in possession any fish taken through the ice in said pond. During open season on said pond it shall be unlawful for any person in any one day to take, catch or kill or have in possession more than fifteen pounds of fish in all taken from said pond.

Penalty for
violation.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching of trout and land-locked salmon.

Jurisdiction
of courts.

Section 3. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties, shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 250.

An Act to amend section one of chapter four hundred and seven of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and three, as amended, relating to Fishing in Hayden Lake, so called, in the town of Madison, in Somerset County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Ice fishing
in Hayden,
lake, regu-
lated.

It shall be lawful to fish through the ice, in accordance with the general law of the state, in Hayden lake, so called, in the town of Madison, in Somerset county, from daylight to sunset on Saturday of each week. So much of section
