for flowing lands occasioned by raising a head of water for the working of mills.

Section 3. Nothing in this act shall be construed as giving to said George F. L'Abbee, his heirs or assigns, any title to the land occupied or flowed by said dam.

Shall not acquire title to land.

Section 4. The right of said L'Abbee to maintain the dam under this act shall terminate on the expiration of the lease of the land occupied by said dam.

When right to maintain dam shall terminate.

Chapter 278.

An Act to regulate the taking of fish in certain waters in Somerset County and in the Northern part of Franklin County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch or kill or have in possession more than ten pounds of land-locked salmon, trout or togue in all in any one day during the open season on the same in any of the following named waters in Somerset county and in Franklin county, to wit: In any of the brooks, streams, rivers, ponds or lakes in townships one, two, three and four, range five, Somerset county; townships one, two, three, four and five, range six, Somerset county; townships two, three, four, five and six, range seven, Somerset county, all in the B. K. P., W. K. R., Somerset county; townships two, three, four (Jackman) five and six, range one, Somerset county; townships two, three, four (Moose river), five and six, range two, Somerset county; townships two, three, four and five, range three, Somerset county; townships three and four, range four, Somerset county; townships three and four, range five, Somerset county, all N. B. K. P., Somerset county; township one, range six, Franklin county; townships one and two, range seven, Franklin county; townships one and two, range eight, Franklin county; township one, range nine, Franklin county, all W. B. K. P., Franklin county.

Taking land-locked salmon, trout or togue in certain waters of Somerset county and northern part of Franklin county, regulated.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching land-locked salmon, trout and togue.

Penalty for violation.

Section 3. In all prosecutions under this chapter, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, for-

feitures and penalties received for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 279.

An Act to regulate fishing in Taylor Pond, in Auburn, Androscoggin County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Ice fishing
in Taylor
pond, pro-
hibited.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time on or through the ice in Taylor pond, so called, in Auburn, in Androscoggin county, under the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for and catching trout and land-locked salmon.

Jurisdiction
of courts.

Section 2. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer, and credited to fines and license fees for the protection of birds and game.

Chapter 280.

An Act to provide for a close time on Deer on Cross Island and on Scotch Island, in Washington County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Close time
on deer.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to hunt, chase, catch, kill or destroy any deer at any time on Cross island or Scotch island, so called, in the county of Washington, for a period of ten years from the time this act takes effect. It shall also be unlawful for any person to have in possession at any time any deer killed on said Cross island or on Scotch island, so called.

Penalty for
violation of
this act.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal hunting, chasing, catching, killing or destroying of deer.
