Section 13. The first meeting shall be called by one or more of the incorporators by giving notice thereof stating the time, place and purpose of the meeting to each incorporator in writing, or by publishing in some newspaper printed in the county of Franklin at least fourteen days prior to the time appointed therefor.

Chapter 321.

An Act authorizing and empowering Albert C. Page and Roger G. Leonard to erect and maintain a boom and piers in the Passadumkeag River.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. Albert C. Page and Roger G. Leonard, severally owning mills for the manufacture of lumber, located on the Passadumkeag river at the village of Passadumkeag in the county of Penobscot, their heirs and assigns, are hereby authorized and empowered, jointly, to locate, erect and maintain in said Passadumkeag river, at Snake Island point, so called, a boom with necessary piers for the purpose of collecting, holding, separating and sorting out logs and other lumber coming down said Passadumkeag river, destined for use and manufacture at their mills or the mills of either of them; provided, however, that as many sorting gaps as can be worked to advantage are constructed, maintained and used for the passage of logs or other lumber through said boom. Said piers and boom shall be so located, constructed, maintained and used that logs and lumber running down said river belonging to other parties and not destined for use and manufacture at the mills of either said Page or Leonard, their heirs and assigns, shall not be unreasonably impeded or delayed, and shall be turned by as soon as they practically can be sorted and separated from the logs and lumber destined for use and manufacture at the mills aforesaid.

Boom and piers authorized in Passadumkeag river, at Snake Island point.

—shall not unreasonably delay logs of other parties.

Section 2. The Passadumkeag Log Driving Company, a corporation existing under the laws of the state of Maine shall have the right at any time to appoint an agent who is hereby authorized and empowered, and whose duty it shall be, to take charge of and superintend the sorting of the logs and other lumber running through the boom herein authorized, and said Page and Leonard at the time of the appointment of such agent shall furnish such agent a list of marks upon all logs and other lumber intended to be manufactured at their mills, and such agent shall see to it that the logs and other lumber not intended to be manufactured at the mills of said

Log Driving Company may appoint an agent.

—duty of agent.

—agent shall be furnished a list of marks.

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—compensation of agent, and by whom paid.

Agent, or person in charge of drive, may employ help to expedite sorting of logs, etc., to be paid by said Page and Leonard.

—stray logs shall be turned out.

Page or said Leonard are not unreasonably detained in or by said boom. The compensation of such agent shall not exceed two dollars fifty cents per day and shall be paid by said Page and Leonard.

Section 3. If upon the approach of the rear of any drive of logs to the boom herein authorized to be constructed and maintained, it shall appear to such agent, or in case no such agent shall have been appointed, to the person in charge of such drive, that said Page and Leonard have not sufficient men to sort and turn by the logs or other lumber arriving at said boom, so that such drive may be unreasonably impeded or delayed, such agent or person, upon notice in writing to said Page and Leonard or either of them, their respective heirs and assigns, shall have the right to put men of his own selection upon said boom to expedite the sorting and turning by of the logs and other lumber in such drive, who shall be paid by said Page and Leonard, their heirs or assigns. Any stray logs or other lumber not destined for use and manufacture at the mills aforesaid, if found in the boom aforesaid shall be turned out by said Page and Leonard, their heirs or assigns, at their expense, upon written demand of the owners thereof.

Chapter 322.

An Act to amend Chapter one hundred and fifty-four of the private and Special Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-five as amended by Chapter one hundred and fifty-seven of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and seven, relating to the charter of the Wiscasset Water Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 9, Chapter 154, special laws, 1895, as amended by Chapter 157, special laws, 1907, further amended.

Section 1. Section nine of chapter one hundred and fifty-four of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-five as amended by chapter one hundred and fifty-seven of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and seven is hereby amended as follows: The word "fourteen" in said section as amended is stricken out and the word 'sixteen' inserted, so that the section shall read as follows:

Chapter 154, special laws, 1895, revised.

'Section nine of this act shall become null and void in sixteen years from the approval thereof unless the corporation shall have organized and commenced actual construction of its works under this charter.'

Section 2. Said chapter one hundred and fifty-four of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-five is hereby revised, as above amended.
