**Chapter 306.**

Resolve to provide Means for Examination of Claims for State Pensions.

Resolved, that the state pension clerk is hereby authorized to expend such sum, under the direction of the governor and council, not exceeding three hundred dollars yearly, as may be necessary to properly examine the claims presented to his office, the same to be paid out of the appropriation for soldiers' pensions for the years nineteen hundred and nine and nineteen hundred and ten.

**Chapter 307.**

Resolve in favor of Preserving the Life of Fish in the Hatcheries and for the Temporary Operation of the Hatcheries and Feeding Stations of the State.

Resolved, whereas the state of Maine has in operation nine fish hatcheries and feeding stations for fish in the various parts of the state, in which there are approximately three hundred thousand live fish to be fed and raised for the purpose of stocking the lakes and ponds of the state, which fish have to be fed daily and help employed to feed them and to take proper care of them,

And whereas, there are approximately three millions of fish eggs in these hatcheries which are hatching and which have to have proper care and attention,

And whereas the employees of these fish hatcheries have not received any pay for three months for their service,

And whereas the bills for feed for these fish have not been paid for a period of three months,

And whereas, the superintendents of these hatcheries have been notified that further credit will not be extended until payment of these bills is made,

And whereas, there is no provision by law by which the state can protect this large and valuable property, no funds being available for this purpose,

And whereas, by reason of the foregoing facts the appropriation called for in this resolve is exceedingly necessary for the purpose of the public health and safety, and in the opinion of this legislature constitutes an emergency, as contemplated by the constitution,

Resolved, that the sum of ten thousand dollars is hereby appropriated, to be taken from the general appropriation heretofore made by this legislature for the operation of fish hatcheries and feeding stations, to be expended by the commissioners of inland fisheries and game, under the direction of the governor and council. In view of the facts recited in the preamble, this resolve, two thirds of all the members elected to each house having so directed, shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 308.

Resolved, that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of five hundred dollars to George H. Winn for services as clerk, one hundred and fifty dollars to Ivy B. Pierce for services as stenographer, and one hundred dollars to William B. Nulty for services as messenger to the legal affairs committee of the seventy-fourth legislature.
