gation to maintain and operate the said part of said railroad and shall hold the same fully discharged from any such obligation to operate and maintain.

Certificate of abandonment shall be filed with R. R. Commissioners and secretary of state.

Section 3. Said company in case of and after any abandonment by it and said purchaser in case of and after any abandonment by said purchaser shall prepare in duplicate a certificate setting forth the fact of abandonment and what part or parts of the said part of said railroad has been abandoned and a general description thereof and file one of the copies of said certificate in the office of the railroad commissioners and one in the office of the secretary of state.

Chapter 31.

An Act to regulate fishing in Tom Pond, so-called, sometimes called Thomas pond or Lake Keoka, in the town of Waterford, County of Oxford.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows :

Close time for fishing in Tom pond.

Section 1. There shall be an annual close time for fishing for any kind of fish in Tom pond, so-called, sometimes called Thomas pond or lake Keoka, in the town of Waterford, in the county of Oxford, from the first day of October of each year to the fifteenth day of June of the following year, both days inclusive, during which close time it shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in said lake.

—unlawful to have fish in possession.

It shall also be unlawful for any person to have in possession any kind of fish taken in close time in the above named lake.

Penalty for violation of this act.

Section 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal fishing for or taking, catching, killing or having in possession of trout or land-locked salmon.

Court jurisdiction.

Section 3. In all prosecutions arising under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme judicial and superior courts, and all fines, penalties and forfeitures received for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer.
