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CHAP. 51**Chapter 51.**

An Act to amend chapter three hundred thirteen of the Private Laws of the year nineteen hundred and nine entitled "An Act to abolish Rines Hill grade crossing in Augusta."

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Section 2,

Section two of chapter three hundred and thirteen of the private laws of the year nineteen hundred and nine entitled "An Act to abolish Rines Hill grade crossing in the city of Augusta" is hereby repealed.

**Chapter 52.**

An Act to extend the Charter of the Fairfield and Skowhegan Railway Company.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

two years.

The rights, powers and privileges of the Fairfield and Skowhegan Railway Company, which were granted by chapter two hundred and sixty of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and seven, and extended by chapter eleven of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and nine, are hereby extended for two years from the approval of this act, and the persons named in said act, their associates and successors, shall have all the rights, powers and privileges that were granted them by said act, to be exercised in the same manner and for the same purposes as provided in said act.

**Chapter 53.**

An Act to authorize the Virginia Spring Water Company to take land for the purposes of its incorporation.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Section I. The Virginia Spring Water Company, a corporation duly organized and located at Rumford in the county of Oxford and state of Maine is hereby authorized and empowered to take, store and use the water from Blanchard brook, so-called, in said Rumford, for domestic and fire purposes in said Rumford. Said brook rises on land of Rufus J. Virgin and flows through land of Waldo Pettingill and George D. Bisbee and land of the heirs of Augustus J. Knight and land of the heirs of George E. Blanchard to the Androscoggin river.
