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**CHAP. 96**

Amount of fish to be taken.

Penalty for violation.

Jurisdiction of courts.

—fines, etc., to whom paid.

Section 2. During open season for ice fishing in said Eagle lake it shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch or kill in any one day more than fifteen pounds of fish in all.

Section 3. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for illegal taking, catching, killing or having in possession of trout or land-locked salmon.

Section 4. In all prosecutions under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme judicial and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties recovered for violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer.

**Chapter 96.**

An Act to repeal chapter three hundred and twenty-six of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and nine, relating to fishing in Webb's river and its tributaries, in the town of Carthage, in the County of Franklin.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Chapter 326, special laws 1909, repealed.

Chapter three hundred and twenty-six of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and nine is hereby repealed.

**Chapter 97.**

An Act to regulate fishing in the tributaries of Big Concord Pond, in the town of Woodstock, in the County of Oxford, and to repeal Chapter three hundred and forty-seven of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and five.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Fishing in Big Concord pond, to regulate.

—open season.

Penalty.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish at any time in any of the tributaries of Big Concord pond, in the town of Woodstock, in the county of Oxford, except it shall be lawful to fish in any of said tributaries on Wednesday and on Friday of each week in accordance with the general law of the state.

Section 2. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal taking, catching, killing or having in possession of trout or land-locked salmon.

Section 3. In all prosecutions arising under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices, within their respective counties, shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme judicial and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties received for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer.

Section 4. Chapter three hundred and forty-seven of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and nine is hereby repealed.

### Chapter 98.

An Act to extend the provisions of Chapter three hundred and sixty-one of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and seven, relating to fishing in the Fenderson Brook, and its tributaries, in the town of Parsonsfield.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

The provisions of chapter three hundred and sixty-one of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and seven, relating to fishing in the Fenderson brook, so-called, and its tributaries, in the town of Parsonsfield, are hereby extended for a term of two years from the time this act takes effect.

Provisions of chapter 361, special laws of 1907, extended.

### Chapter 99.

An Act to amend Chapter one hundred and sixty of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and nine, relating to fishing in Spear Stream and its tributaries, in the town of Peru, in the County of Oxford.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Section one of chapter one hundred and sixty of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and nine is hereby amended by inserting after the word "in" in the fifth line thereof the following words: 'Spear stream and in any of', so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

Section 1, chapter 160, special laws 1909, amended.

'Section 1. It shall be unlawful for a term of six years from the time this act takes effect, to fish for, take, catch or kill any kind of fish in Spear stream, so-called, or in any of its tributaries, in Peru, in the county of Oxford, except it may be lawful to fish in Spear stream and in any of the tributaries of Spear stream, so-called, on Tuesday and Saturday of each week, in accordance with the general law of the state.'

To regulate fishing in Spear pond, Spear stream and tributaries.
