Chapter 127.

An Act to ratify the change of name of Brunswick Power Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

The change of name of the Brunswick Power Company to Bath and Brunswick Light and Power Company and the purchase, pursuant to the authority of chapter three hundred and ninety of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and nine, by said company, under said last name, of the franchises and assets of the Brunswick Electric Light and Power Company and of Sagadahock Light and Power Company, and the first mortgage and refunding bonds of said Bath and Brunswick Light and Power Company bearing date July first, nineteen hundred and nine, and the mortgage securing the same dated November third, nineteen hundred and ten, executed and issued, pursuant to the authority of said chapter three hundred and ninety, are in all respects hereby ratified, approved, confirmed and made valid.

Chapter 128.

An Act giving the Rumford Falls Village Corporation additional powers to raise money.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

The Rumford Falls Village Corporation, located in Rumford, Maine, is hereby authorized at any legal meeting called and held for said purpose or purposes to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of acquiring by purchase, land for parks or playgrounds within its limits; also for the purpose of aiding in building and caring for a hospital, known as the Rumford General Hospital. The corporation is also authorized to take title to land so purchased, also acquired by gift.
