PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

STATE OF MAINE

As Passed by the Seventy-fifth Legislature

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Section 2. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general law of the state for the illegal taking, catching or killing of trout or land-locked salmon.

Снар. 158 Penalty.

Section 3. In all prosecutions arising under this act municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme judicial and superior courts, and

jurisdiction.

all fines, forfeitures and penalties recovered by any person for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer.

Chapter 158.

An Act to amend Section one of Chapter one hundred and seventy-nine of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and five, relating to fishing in Marble Brook, and Marble Pond, so-called, tributary waters to the Piscataguis River, situated partly in the town of Blanchard, County of Piscataguis, and in Chase Brook, sometimes called Blackstone Brook, also situated partly in said Blanchard.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

So much of section one of chapter one hundred and seventy- portion of nine of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and five as prohibits fishing in Marble brook and in Marble pond, so-called, tributary waters to the Piscataquis river, situated partly in the town of Blanchard, in the county of Piscataguis, and in Chase brook, sometimes called Blackstone brook, also situated partly in said Blanchard, in accordance with the general law of the state, is hereby repealed.

Chapter 159.

An Act relating to the charter of the Hancock County Railway Company. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

The rights, powers and privileges of the Hancock County Charter Railway Company which were granted by chapter three hun-two years. dred one of the private and special laws of the state of Maine for the year nineteen hundred one, as extended and enlarged by chapter one hundred six of the private and special laws for the year nineteen hundred three, by chapter two hundred twenty-nine of the private and special laws for the year nineteen hundred five, by chapter seventy-three of the private and special

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laws for the year nineteen hundred seven, and by chapter seventy-three of the private and special laws for the year nineteen hundred nine, are hereby extended for two years additional, and the persons named in said act, their associates and successors, shall have the rights, powers and privileges that were granted to them by said acts to be exercised by them for the same purpose specified in said act.

Chapter 160.

An Act to extend the charter of the Eastport Street Railway Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Charter extended.

The rights, powers and privileges of the Eastport Street Railway Company which were granted by chapter four hundred and sixty-five of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, and extended by chapter one hundred and seventeen of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, and further extended by chapter two hundred and sixty-eight of the private and special law of nineteen hundred and one, and further extended by chapter two hundred and sixty-four of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and three, and further extended by chapter one hundred and thirteen of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and five, and further extended by chapter two hundred and twenty-five of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and seven, and further extended by chapter one hundred and forty-six of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and nine, are hereby further extended for and during the period of two years from the seventeenth day of March, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eleven, and all the rights, powers, privileges and franchises that were granted and have been acquired by virtue of or under said acts may and shall be exercised in the same manner and for the same purposes as provided in said chapter four hundred and sixty-five.
