CHAP. 212

Chapter 212.

An Act to regulate Fishing in Sandy Stream, so-called, a tributary to Moxie Pond, in the County of Somerset.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Fishing in Sandy stream regulated.

Section 1. It shall be lawful to fish in Sandy stream, so-called, a tributary to Moxie pond, in the county of Somerset, in accordance with the general law of the state; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch or kill any trout in said Sandy stream less than six inches in length; it shall also be unlawful for any person to have in possession any trout less than six inches in length taken from said Sandy stream.

—length of fish that may be legally taken.

Penalty.

Section 2. Whoever violates any provision of this act shall be subject to the same penalty as is provided in the general laws of the state for the illegal taking, catching or killing of trout and land-locked salmon.

Inconsistent acts repealed.

Section 3. All acts or parts of acts, whether public or private and special, inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.

Court jurisdiction.

Section 4. In all prosecutions arising under this act, municipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the supreme judicial and superior courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties recovered by any person for any violation of this act shall be paid forthwith by the person receiving the same to the state treasurer.

Chapter 213.

An Act to amend the charter of the Bangor Boom Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1, chapter 78, special laws, 1899, amended.

Section one of chapter seventy-eight of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine is hereby amended by striking out in the seventh line the word "six" and inserting in the place thereof the word 'ten' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

Charter shall continue for 20 years from March, 1898.

'Section 1. The charter of the Bangor Boom Company, with all the rights and privileges and all the responsibilities attaching to said company by virtue of the several acts creating, extending and relating thereto, shall continue and remain in force for twenty years from March, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, provided, however, that said company shall receive as toll, ten cents for each thousand feet, in lieu of twenty cents as provided in

chapter seventy-five of the special laws of the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, in the case therein provided of the work of driving and rafting being done by one contractor, as now done.'

Chapter 214.

An Act to repeal Chapter three hundred and seventeen of the Special Laws of nineteen hundred and one as amended by Chapter three hundred and seventy-five of the Special Laws of nineteen hundred and seven, relative to the Protection of Lobsters in waters adjacent to Lubec and Trescott.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Chapter three hundred and seventeen of the special laws of nineteen hundred and one, entitled, "An Act to protect lobsters in the waters adjacent to the shores of the towns of Lubec and Trescott as amended by chapter three hundred and seventy-nine of the special laws of nineteen hundred and seven," is hereby repealed.

Chapter 317, special laws, 1901, as amended by chapter 375, special laws, 1907, repealed.

Chapter 215.

An Act to extend the open season for fishing for Land-locked Salmon, Trout and Togue, in Great Pond and in Long Pond, in Kennebec County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1. In addition to the open season now provided by law during which it shall be lawful to fish for land-locked salmon, trout and togue, in Great pond, so-called, and in Long pond, so-called, said ponds being part of the Belgrade chain of lakes, so-called, in the county of Kennebec, it shall be lawful to fish only with artificial flies or by the method known as fly fishing in said Great pond and in said Long pond from September fifteenth of each year to October first following, for land-locked salmon, trout and togue, in accordance with the general law of the state.

Open season for fishing in Great and Long ponds extended.

—may fish with artificial flies only.

Section 2. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

Inconsistent acts repealed.
