CHAP. 224

and along and upon any of the highways, town ways, streets and bridges in said towns of Liberty, Montville, Searsmont, Morrill, Belmont, Waldo, Knox and Palermo; but in such a manner as not to incommode or endanger the customary and public use thereof; and the company may cut down any trees standing within the limits of said highways, town ways, streets or bridges, except fruit, ornamental or shade trees, when necessary for the erection, use and safety of its lines.'

—but shall not endanger public use thereof.
—may cut down trees.

—exception.

Section 4. All permits to construct telegraph and telephone lines in any of the towns mentioned in said chapter one hundred and eight of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, procured by the Liberty and Belfast Telegraph Company, whether by that name or by the name of "The Liberty and Belfast Telegraph and Telephone Company," and all acts and doings of said company in constructing its lines of telegraph and telephone in any of the towns mentioned in the preceding section are hereby made legal and valid.

Chapter 108, special laws 1887, made applicable.

Chapter 224.

An Act to repeal Chapter two hundred and seventy-six of the Private and Special Laws of one thousand nine hundred and seven, entitled "An Act for the better protection of shell fish within the town of Yarmouth in the County of Cumberland."

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Chapter two hundred and seventy-six of the private and special laws of one thousand nine hundred and seven, entitled, "An Act for the better protection of shell fish within the town of Yarmouth in the county of Cumberland," is hereby repealed.

Chapter 276, special laws, 1907, repealed.

Chapter 225.

An Act to extend the charter of the Weld Water Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

All the rights, powers and privileges of the Weld Water Company which were granted by chapter one hundred and sixty-eight of the private and special laws of one thousand nine hundred and seven, are hereby extended for and during the period of two years from the sixth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

Charter extended for two years.

CHAP. 226

And all the rights, powers and privileges that were granted by said act, may and shall be exercised in the same manner and for the same purposes as provided in said act.

Chapter 226.

An Act to amend Section one of Chapter two hundred and thirty-one of the Private and Special Laws of nineteen hundred and nine relating to the Aroostook Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Section 1,
chapter 231,
special laws,
1909,
amended.

Amend section one of chapter two hundred and thirty-one of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and nine by striking out in the tenth line in the said section the words "County of Aroostook," and inserting the words 'State of Maine', so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Corporators.

'Section 1. George W. Irving, E. L. Cleveland, Fred Simonson, D. W. Corey, C. A. Powers, G. M. Colbath, H. W. Safford, T. B. Bradford, E. S. Stackpole, E. S. Perry, and R. L. Pitcher with all other members that may hereafter be admitted to the company, are hereby made a corporation under the name of the Aroostook Mutual Fire Insurance Company, for the purpose only of carrying on business as a mutual fire insurance company for insurance upon potatoes, local or in transit, and upon potato-houses and other real and personal property in the state of Maine with all the powers, rights and privileges, and subject to all the duties, liabilities and restrictions set forth in all the general laws of the state relating to such insurance companies, except as herein provided.'

Chapter 227.

An Act to incorporate the Bayville Village Corporation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Description
of territory

Section 1. That part of the territory of the town of Boothbay Harbor, in the county of Lincoln, embraced within the limits described as follows: Commencing at the southerly point of the boundary line between the town of Boothbay and Boothbay Harbor, on Linekins bay, so-called, and extending northerly along said boundary line to a point where the line extended along a certain stone wall which runs east and west near the
