First meeting,
how called.

(\$150,000), and shall be divided into shares of one hundred dollars (\$100) each; said corporation may issue its bonds to secure money for the carrying out of any of the purposes of said corporation to an amount not in excess of its then capital stock to be secured by mortgage of its real estate, property, rights, privileges and franchises. It is also hereby authorized to lease any part or all of its property, privileges and franchises upon such terms as it may determine.

Section 10. The first meeting of said corporation may be called by written notice thereof signed by one of the incorporators herein named and served upon each incorporator by giving him the same in hand or leaving the same at his last and usual place of abode at least five days before said meeting.

Chapter 260.

An Act establishing a close time on Lobsters in the waters of Winter Harbor, in Hancock County.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Close time
on lobsters
in waters of
Winter Har-
bor.

Section 1. No person shall take, catch, kill or destroy any lobsters between the first day of July and the first day of September in each year in any of the waters of Winter Harbor in Hancock county inside of a direct line from Schoodic island whistling buoy, thence northwest by west to Egg Rock whistling buoy, and thence northeast by north to Jordan's island bar; and no person shall set a trap within said waters for the purpose of taking, catching, killing or destroying any lobsters between said dates; under a penalty of one dollar (\$1.00) for each lobster so taken, caught, killed or destroyed, and under a penalty of five dollars (\$5.00) for each lobster trap so set for said purpose.

Penalty.

Section 2. All fines and penalties provided for by this act may be recovered as provided by section forty-eight of chapter two hundred and eighty-five of the public laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven.
