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## CHAP. 52

**Chapter 52.**

An Act to Extend the Charter of the Fairfield and Skowhegan Railway Company.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Charter extended for two years from approval of this act.

Section 1. The rights, powers and privileges of the Fairfield and Skowhegan Railway Company, which were granted by chapter two hundred and sixty of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and seven, and extended by chapter fifty-two of the private and special laws of nineteen hundred and eleven are hereby extended for two years from the approval of this act, and the persons named in said act, their associates and successors, shall have all the rights, powers and privileges that were granted them by said act, to be exercised in the same manner and for the same purposes as provided in said act.

**Chapter 53.**

An Act to Extend the Charter of the Waldo Street Railway Company.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Charter extended for two years from the time when this act takes effect

Section 1. The time within which the Waldo Street Railway Company shall actually commence business under its charter is hereby extended two years from the date when this act shall take effect.

**Chapter 54.**

An Act to Extend the Time in Which the Maine Title Insurance Company is Authorized to Commence Business.

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:*

Charter extended for two years from time when this act takes effect

Section 1. Chapter one hundred and forty-eight of the private and special laws of the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven is hereby continued in force, and the corporators named therein are hereby given a further period of two years from the time this act shall take effect in which to organize and commence business under said act.
